## **1 INTRODUCTION**

### **1.1 Purpose of this Manual:**

This Manual has been developed by the Executive of the Oceania Shooting Federation (OSF) as a reference document to assist future administrators in the preparation for, and the conduct of, the Oceania Regional and Oceania Grand Prix Shooting Championships. It is not seen as an exhaustive document but rather as one that can be developed, improved and expanded as the experience grows within the region. Future administrators are encouraged to undertake regular reviews of the procedures to ensure they are current and relevant.

From the practical experience obtained over recent championships, it is fully appreciated that the depth of knowledge and the time commitment necessary to administer such an event is extensive. We urge that this not be underestimated, and it is firmly recommended that a core Organising Committee be established a minimum of two years ahead, with a chairperson experienced in the international scene.

The importance of the event to the athletes should also not be underestimated, and as such, we owe it to all participants to conduct the event in a manner consistent with their expectations. Attention is drawn to the invaluable role of the many volunteers necessary to conduct these Championships. It is vital their contribution is not forgotten. If we strive for a partnership between all participants, be that athletes, technical staff or range volunteers we can conduct an event equal to any worldwide.

The reputation of the Oceania Federation is growing amongst Pacific Rim countries and therefore it is in everyone's interest to foster those relationships; not only for the possibility of return invitations but the continued support of the region by our friends in the wider shooting fraternity.

Expansion of the number of National Federations participating in Sports Shooting is a priority for the continued survival of the region. Every endeavour must be made to encourage the sport of shooting in our area of influence. The separation of the Olympic and Non-Olympic events into concurrent Championships has been necessary due to the entry fee criteria established by the ISSF. This is not seen as an impediment, but an opportunity to grow our sport for the benefit of firearm owners throughout our region.

## **2 MEMBERSHIP OF OCEANIA SHOOTING FEDERATION**

### **2.1 Membership**

Membership of the Oceania Shooting Federation (OSF) is governed by the Oceania region as determined by the International Olympic Committee.

### **2.2 Full Membership**

To obtain full membership, a country must be registered by the ISSF<sup>1</sup> as a member Federation representing the sport of shooting within that country. For the purposes of this Manual, a country from within the region that is awarded provisional membership of the ISSF shall be regarded as a full member. However, until full membership is granted by the ISSF, limitations apply in regard to Olympic Quota Places<sup>2</sup>.

### **2.3 Associate Membership**

Due to the special nature of the Oceania Region, with a number of potential members being states or territories of other countries, a system of Associate membership has been established to allow full participation within Oceania of those members.

Such Associate members are required to make a commitment to the region, and not seek selection, qualification etc in their parent country. This system of Associate membership has been approved by the ISSF.

A country from within the Oceania region, which complies with one of the following criteria, may apply to become an Associate member.

A country, which has an NOC, is not a member of the ISSF but has a Federation that represents the sport of target shooting within that country. (A country meeting this clause would be expected, after attending two Oceania Regional Shooting Championships, and competing in ISSF events, to seek membership of the ISSF and on granting of such membership would automatically transfer to Full membership of the Oceania region), or

A country that does not have an NOC but has a Federation that represents the sport of target shooting within that country. c) A country, which is affiliated to the ISSF via another country, but has a Federation that represents the sport of target shooting within that country.

### **2.5 Residency Requirements - Member Federations.**

### **2.5.1 Residency Requirements – ISSD & ISCD Championship Events**

Refer to APPENDIX D - ISSF DECLARATIONS

### **2.5.2 Residency Requirements of Associate Members Countries and all Non-ISSF/ISCD Events.**

For members of Associate countries and Non-ISSF Event competitors, residency requirements have been established as follows: It is the policy of the Oceania Shooting Federation, that entry will only be accepted from a bona fide resident of the country they wish to represent and have been resident for a continuous period of at least three years. For Non-ISSF events, this period may be reduced or cancelled with the agreement of the two countries concerned, and final approval of the OSF Executive Committee.

### **3 APPLICATIONS TO HOST OCEANIA and OCEANIA GRAND PRIX SHOOTING CHAMPIONSHIP**

#### **3.1 Terms of Reference.**

OSF is the governing body and grants the rights to a Member Federation (hereafter referred to as Host Association) to run the Championships on its behalf.

The Host Federation is granted the right to run the Championships on behalf of the OSF and is responsible to that Federation for their effectiveness and success.

#### **3.2 Eligibility to Apply.**

All Full and Associate members are eligible to apply to host the Oceania Regional and Oceania Grand Prix Shooting Championships.

#### **3.3 Notification of Application.**

Federations are encouraged to notify the OSF at least three years ahead of their intention to apply to conduct the championship.

#### **3.4 Form of Application.**

The country and venue are approved by the OSF General Assembly four years pre-championship. The Form of Application (see Form 2) should be submitted to the Oceania Secretary two months prior to the annual meeting to enable adequate circulation of the application.

---

## 4 PLANNING

### **Two Year Time Line.**

The following time line has been established to enable the OSF to monitor that preparations for the championship are on schedule. Applicants are expected to conform to this schedule.

### **Two Years Pre-Competition**

Allocation of country and venue.

### **Eighteen Months Pre - Competition**

Formal confirmation sent to the OSF Secretary of events to be conducted. Oceania Secretary to seek appointment from the ISSF of Technical Delegate.

### **Twelve Months Pre - Competition**

Submit to the OSF Annual Meeting:

Draft programme (see Appendix A Form 5).

Estimated entry fees.

Accommodation arrangements.

Call for applications for technical staff (see Appendix A Form 3 for Form of Application).

Send invitation to guest countries for expressions of interest.

Send invitation to member countries for preliminary entries by event

Submission of targets to the ISSF for testing, measurement and approval.

### **Nine Months Pre - Competition**

Closing date for entries from member Federations by event.

Notify member Federations if any Championship event will not be proceeded with, due to inadequate confirmed participation.

Send invitation to guest countries for preliminary entries by event.

Appoint and notify appointment to Jury's and proposed duties.

Match Director calls for applications for range personnel.

### **Three Months Pre - Competition**

Closing date for final entries for number of competitors and teams from member Federations.

Payment of non-refundable entry fees deposit (50%)

Notify guest countries of allocation of events and numbers of competitors by event that can be accepted.

Supplies in store (targets, score cards, range sheets, report sheets, patches etc).

### **One Month Pre - Competition**

Closing date of final entry of competitors by name.

Entries for ISSF Championship events must also have the ISSF ID Numbers

### **Day of Arrival.**

Payment of the balance of Entry Fee and Transport Levy.

### **Two Days Prior.**

Technical Meeting

Unofficial Practice

### **One Day Prior.**

Official Practice Day (PET)

### **Notification of Entry**

A procedure should be developed to ensure notification to members / guests that their entry information has been received. This should include confirmation of matches entered. For non-Oceania Federation guests it is an appropriate time to stress their inability to be awarded Oceania or Oceania Grand Prix medals, ISSF Olympic Quota places or ISSF Olympic MQS unless availability of the ISSF Olympic MQS has been approved in writing by the ISSF.

---

## **5 AUTHORITY AND PROTOCOLS**

### **5.1 Authority.**

The Oceania Regional Championships are conducted on the authority of the ISSF every two years, under the control of the Oceania Shooting Federation. The Oceania Grand Prix Championships are conducted on the authority of the Oceania Shooting Federation.

### **5.2 Conduct of ISSF events.**

Events covered by the ISSF Rules and Regulations will be conducted at the Oceania Regional and Oceania Grand Prix Shooting Championships in accordance with those Rules and Regulations unless exceptions are provided for within this manual. As a general interpretation the Special Technical Rules of individual events will take precedence, however some General Technical Rules may be altered in accordance with this manual.

### **5.3 ISSF Quota Places:**

OSF Full members may enter up to three (3) shooters nominated for Quota Place in each IOC event<sup>4</sup>.

### **5.4 ISSF MQS:**

OSF Full members, OSF Associate members, and Guest Federations meeting OSF rule 5.17.1.3 may enter up to two (2) shooters nominated for MQS in each IOC event.

### **5.5 Conduct of ISCD events.**

Events covered by the ISCD Rules and Regulations will be conducted at the Oceania Regional and Oceania Grand Prix Shooting Championships in accordance with those Rules and Regulations unless exceptions are provided for within this manual. As a general interpretation the Special Technical Rules of individual events will take precedence, however some General Technical Rules may be altered in accordance with this manual.

### **5.6 ISCD MQS**

Federations meeting the IPC requirements may enter up to xxxx shooters in each IPC event.

### **5.7 Conduct of non-ISSF/ISCD Events.**

Non – ISSF/ISCD events will be conducted in accordance with the international regulations of that discipline and / or the rules contained within this manual.

### **5.8 Changes to Rules to be used at Oceania and Oceania Grand Prix Shooting Championships.**

It will be for the controlling bodies within the region to ensure appropriate updated information is provided to the OSF Executive in time for their meeting which is held 12 months prior to each championship. Should such information not be presented and approved, then the competition will proceed on the basis of the published information, unless a temporary change is provided to the Organising Committee, signed by all competing countries, as such a change having their agreement.

### **5.9 New Competition Events & Moribund Events**

This manual contains all events that are currently approved by the OSF for competition

#### **5.9.1 Moribund events**

Moribund events (10.6.3) may be reintroduced subject to guarantees from the Oceania members that the requirements of 5.7 can be met.

### **5.9.2 New Competition Events**

Should a member Federation wish to include an additional event or competition on the programme, such detail must be submitted to the OSF Executive meeting 12 months before competition.

Such application must be accompanied by the Rules of Competition under which the event will be conducted and confirmation that all administrative matters (medals, teams etc) provided in this manual will prevail.

### **5.10 Minimum Number of Individual Competitors.**

For a Championship event to be conducted, a minimum number of competitors in an Individual event shall be six participants from a minimum of two Oceania Federations. Any Championship event, in which participation cannot be confirmed nine months prior to the OSF Championships, will not be proceeded with by the Organising Committee.

#### **5.10.1 Maximum Number of Individual Competitors.**

Each participating country may enter a maximum number of nine (9) competitors in each grade or category.

### **5.11 Participation Numbers.**

Information has been prepared on previous championship participation numbers as a guide to Entry information, budget and manpower requirements. Refer to Appendix C for information.

### **5.12 ISSF Elimination events.**

Information should be provided to the Technical Meeting as to whether any elimination events need to be conducted and the arrangements necessary to conduct same including details of how Qualification Series participants will be selected.

For the purposes of clarification, for the conduct of the ISSF 300m events, should here be insufficient targets provided by the Organising Committee to cover all entrants in a particular Individual Match competition, elimination matches will be conducted on the preceding day in accordance with the ISSF Special Technical Rules.

Where used, Elimination Events will be used to conduct the Teams Competition with an equal spread of Team participants in the relays so conducted.

Those eligible to participate in the Qualification Event, will be drawn in equal proportions from each elimination relay, by the highest rank, in accordance with the ISSF Rules.

### **5.13 First Day Programme.**

It is recommended that 3 x 40 and 3 x 20 matches are not held on the first day of competition to ensure the Classification Office has an opportunity to settle its operations.

### **5.14 Teams Competition.**

Separate Teams competition matches will not be conducted, but the Team competition will be decided by the combining of scores from the individual match. In the event of an elimination match being necessary, Team scores will be obtained from the elimination series.

### **5.15 Team Categories.**

The following Team categories are approved:

- Open, or Men and Women, but not both.
- Intermediate.
- Junior.

### **5.16 Categories to be Conducted.**

Each Oceania Affiliate can enter A, B, and C Teams in all events.

Unless the number of an Affiliate's entries for Quota Place and MQS in an event is less than the required three members in a Team (5.12.5):

Entries entered for ISSF Quota place must be in the A Team.

Entries for ISSF MQS-only must be in the B Team.

#### **5.17 Minimum Number of Teams before a Team Competition is held.**

Two teams, one each from two participating Oceania Member Federations.

#### **5.18 Size of Teams**

Teams shall have three competitors per team (unless specifically listed in the event criteria). Teams with less than the required number of team members will not be accepted.

#### **5.19 Age limits**

Intermediate: Under the age of 25 years on 31 December in the year of competition.

Junior: Under the age of 21 years on 31 December in the year of competition (except American Trap and Skeet - age 18 years 14.5.6, 14.6.6).

#### **5.20 Mixed Gender Competition**

In recognition of limitations on number of participants, mixed gender competitions will be allowed in Intermediate and Junior events. Where the ISSF rules provided for different formats between male and female (i.e. Air Pistol), the greater number of shots will be used.

#### **5.21 Medal Distribution**

##### **Teams Championship:**

Two Teams - Gold Medal and Certificate for 2nd place Team.

Three Teams - Gold and Silver Medals and Certificate for 3rd place Team.

Four Teams - Gold, Silver and Bronze Medals.

##### **Individual Championship:**

Six competitors Gold and Silver and Bronze Medals.

Finals Competition

Gold and Silver and Bronze Medals

#### **5.22 Awards – Non-Oceania Federation Member Guests.**

Non-Oceania Member Guests are not eligible to receive Oceania or Oceania Grand Prix Championships Medals. It is recommended however that some suitable form of presentation should be made to invited guests, who for other than this restriction would have received a medal. If more than five Non-Oceania Guests compete in an event, separate suitable awards for 1st, 2nd and 3rd places will be made.

#### **5.23 Entry Eligibility**

##### **OSF ISSF/ISCD Championship Events**

Oceania Full Members:

National Federations within the Oceania region who are members of OSF in good standing, and recognised by their National Olympic Committee as the body responsible for Olympic shooting, are entitled to enter all events in both the team and individual competitions, be awarded Oceania and Oceania Grand Prix Medals, ISSF Olympic Quota Places, Minimum Qualification Scores (ISSF Olympic MQS), and establish Oceania and Oceania Grand Prix records.

National Federations within the Oceania region who are members of OSF in good standing, and recognised by their National Paralympics Committee as the body responsible for Paralympics shooting, are entitled to enter all events in both the team

and individual competitions, be awarded Oceania and Oceania Grand Prix Medals, Minimum Qualification Standard scores (ISCD Paralympics MQS), and establish Oceania and Oceania Grand Prix records.

#### Oceania Associate Members

Federations accepted for OSF Associate membership are entitled to enter all events in both the teams and individual competitions, be awarded Oceania and Oceania Grand Prix Medals and establish Oceania and Oceania Grand Prix records.

#### Guest Federations

National Federations from outside the Oceania region, recognised by their National Olympic Committee as the body responsible for Olympics or Paralympics shooting, are entitled to enter all individual events subject to availability of shooting positions.

#### Individual competition

Three nominated competitors to obtain an ISSF Olympic MQS only if prior written approval for Guest ISSF Olympic MQS has been obtained from the ISSF. Two additional competitors for competition experience.

#### Oceania Grand Prix Championship

Six Competitors per country per category as invited guests. (See 5.16 re Awards)

#### Teams Competition

Non-Oceania Federation member guests are unable to enter the official OSF teams competitions. Should the Organising Committee wish to provide a separate award for Invited Guests participation they are able to do so. (See 5.16 re Awards)

Minimum Qualification Scores (ISSF Olympic MQS) can only be obtained by countries affiliated to the ISSF through a parent country.

##### Cross Entry

Participants can only enter one event or category in any one competition. (ie cannot enter Open and Junior competition in the same event) and once category established, they must continue in this category for all ISSF Events, for the full Championship provided that there has been an event programmed. If no event has been programmed, then the entry in other categories is valid.

The Conduct of all ISSF and ISCD Events on the Olympic/Paralympics Programmes.

All events conducted on the Olympic Games Shooting programme will be mandatory for the Oceania Shooting Championships.

All events conducted on the Paralympics Shooting programme will be mandatory for the Oceania Shooting Championships.

#### Finals Competition Oceania Championship.

The Finals competition in Olympic events will only be held as part of the individual championship and will only be conducted from amongst the highest placed "A" team competitors from Oceania full member Federations (in accordance with the criteria established by 5.27, 5.28).

This "A" team of three shooters is nominated for the quota position and MQS status. Two extra shooters may be nominated for MQS status from the 4 – 9 position.

Should competitors of Associate members qualify for finals positions, the number of competitors will be extended to ensure the full allocation of places for Quota Place competitors. Additional competitors will however be ineligible to claim the championship title and medal/s.

#### Oceania Grand Prix Championship

No Finals competition will be conducted, and entries in Grand Prix events will not included in Finals.

#### Finals Competition – Quota pre-nomination

Member countries must advise the Organising Committee 24 hours in advance, of the names of the three shooters nominated for Quota and the names of the extra two shooters for MQS only.

#### ISSF Minimum Qualification Score

The ISSF has granted the Oceania Shooting Championships, subject to supervision by a ISSF appointed technical delegate and ISSF and NSDA approved drug testing programme, ISSF Olympic MQS status for all Olympic events, for all full member federations.

#### Eligibility for ISSF Olympic MQS events.

All member Federations and guests are eligible to obtain ISSF Olympic MQS in the Olympic events, but only if prior written approval has been granted by the ISSF.

#### ISSF Olympic MQS Limitations.

Each Federation can only nominate five competitors for ISSF Olympic MQS competition in accordance with the current ISSF ruling of which two must be nominated for ISSF Olympic MQS only. Such nominations to be made from the A and B or C Teams . If an elimination series is required, then the ISSF Olympic "MQS only" nominees or guest competitors will not proceed to the qualification event.

#### ISSF Olympic Quota Places.

For the championship held in the two year period prior to the Olympic Games, the championship can award ISSF Olympic Quota places in accordance with the criteria established by the ISSF.

#### Eligibility for Quota Places.

Only competitors from full member Federations of the OSF can be awarded quota places at these championships. Refer to Clause .27.

#### Drug Testing Programme.

See also 6.10

To maintain the ISSF Olympic MQS status and obtain ISSF Olympic Quota places, each Oceania ISSF Championship event must be conducted in accordance with the IOC drug testing regulations and the drug testing programme be approved by the ISSF.

To maintain the ISCD Paralympics MQS status and obtain ISCD MQSs, each Oceania ISCD Championship event must be conducted in accordance with the IPC drug testing regulations and the drug testing programme be approved by the ISCD.

## **6 ORGANISATION**

### **6.1 Organisational Responsibility.**

The responsibility for the Organisation and performance of the Championship, is that of the Member Federation to whom the event is allocated. Although the Host Federation may delegate the responsibility to an Organisation Committee, possibly within a State or Territory within that country, the Host Federation cannot obviate its responsibility for the Championship.

### **6.2 Formation of Organising Committee.**

The most critical issue to be faced by a host Federation is the formation of an Organising Committee that has the desire and knowledge to meet the objectives of conducting a championship that meets the expectations of the ISSF, the OSF and the competitors. The appointment of a Chairman and Management Team requires careful consideration. Of right, the Host Federation shall have a place on the Organisation Committee. In addition, the OSF for its delegated representative, shall have a position of right on the Organising Committee.

### **6.3 Organisation Chart.**

Refer to Section 7 for a suggested Organisational Chart.

### **6.4 Administration Office.**

The establishment of a centralised administration office is required. Should centralised accommodation be provided, it is strongly recommended that such a facility be established at that venue, as considerable activity occurs in the evenings. It will be necessary to arrange manning of the office from 6.30 / 7.00 am to 10.00 pm daily as a minimum, with a provision for extended hours beyond those times especially in the first few days.

THE WORKLOAD SHOULD NOT BE UNDERESTIMATED.

This area will be the overall operations centre. Inquiries from team management, in particular from guests, will be heavy until, such time as they become accustomed to the way our championship is conducted. In addition to the established management positions, the office requires the services of at least two administration staff.

### **6.5 Administration Office Equipment.**

### **6.6 Communications:**

Excellent communications are necessary, with a minimum of two telephone lines and separate facsimile line. Should separate public telephones not be available, a further two pay phones are recommended. A supply of phone cards for sale should be on hand.

Broadband internet connection

Office equipment: further equipment should include a photocopier and preferably a word processor and printer.

### **6.7 Oceania Presidents Office**

A suitable office is to be provided by the Organising Committee, for the use of the Oceania President, for the duration of the Championship. This office should be equipped with suitable communications and facilities for the President to entertain Guests etc.

### **6.8 Official Programme.**

A programme of events including names of athletes together with any relevant administrative information should be supplied to all competitors, team, technical officials and volunteers as necessary.

Any needed changes to the programme should be in accordance with ISSF regulations 5.

### **6.9 Entry Fees.**

The ISSF has mandated a level of entry fee for the conduct of approved Championships. As at 1/1/2001 the fees payable are:

- Shooter or competitor, per event - US\$150.00
- Team Officials (Managers, Coaches, Trainers, Medical Staff etc) US\$50.00

The Organising Committee is not empowered to subvert this requirement. The level of entry fee to be charged for the Oceania Grand Prix Championship is the prerogative of the Organising Committee. Approval "in principle" should be sought from the OSF as to the proposed levels being charged. It is believed that each event / discipline should meet the costs associated with conducting its own event. As a guideline, during the budgeting process the following categories should be considered.

#### **6.9.1 ISSF Olympic Events**

(Oceania Championship) Fee prescribed by ISSF. The Fee is inclusive of the ISSF levy, OSF Levy, local transport (Technical Delegate, Jury, Athletes, Team Manager(s) and Coach(s), drug testing fees, Air Fares (Technical Delegate), Accommodation (Technical Delegate and Jury).

#### **6.9.2 Oceania Grand Prix Championship**

(Fee approved by the OSF Executive.

General administration cost, shared by all entries to OSF and Grand Prix Championship(s), pro-rata apportionment to OSF and GP Championship(s)

ISSF Levy(non ISSF Olympic events) OSF \$USD3.00 per entry (as at 1/1/2001) ISSF SFR3.00 per event where applicable.

Target and Range costs, per match entry apportioned to each championship.

Range Staff costs, per match entry apportioned to each Championship.

Medal and Award costs, per match entry apportioned to each Championship.

Officials Transport, accommodation and other overhead costs associated with the conduct of the Championships per match entry apportioned to each event.

Official Practice costs, per match entry apportioned to each event except for Clay Target which will be on a cost recovery of actual costs(refer 6.9)

#### **6.9.3 Other practice, cost as is occurred for each event.**

Precise information should be provided to participant countries on when payment will be required and the method/s of payment accepted.

#### **6.9.4 Range Development Costs.**

It needs to be recognised that at some venues, established facilities enable events to be conducted with little capital input. Others may require a degree of funding, and therefore cross - subsidy may be appropriate to allow and therefore retain the "Shooting Family" concept.

#### **6.9.5 Practice Fees.**

Reasonable costs of targets etc for published Official Practice Day (usually the day before the competition) is to be included within the entry fees for each event. It is considered the following would be reasonable: Shotgun events – two rounds of targets per competitor per event. All other events – ½ course of targets., Unofficial practice costs can be charged separately, however this should be on a "cost only" recovery basis. All practice fee arrangements should be shown clearly on the entry form.

#### **6.9.6 Refund of Practice Fees.**

Official practice day fees are not refundable. Unofficial practice fees should be refunded if notification is received in writing by the Organising Committee the previous day by 12 noon.

#### **6.9.7 Entry Fee Deposits.**

The ISSF have mandated, that the payment of a 50% deposit on entry fees is payable with preliminary entry applications. This deposit is NON-REFUNDABLE (refer 4.1.7).

### **6.9.8 Late Entries.**

Every endeavour should be made to cope with late entries, however it is considered important that those who have received confirmation and allocation of start places should not be disturbed. Late payment of entry fees will incur a penalty of 10% of the total entry fee payable. If the time-line per [Section - 4 Planning](#) is followed there should be no reason for late entries.

### **6.9.9 Competitor Numbers.**

The use of the competitor name and number is mandatory for the Oceania and Oceania Grand Prix Championships. It is required that each competitor be issued with an individual competitor number,

The competitor number needs to meet the ISSF specification regarding sponsorship rules and should include the competitor number, the shooters surname, IOC country code and if possible a coloured country flag.

These need to be made of a material suitable for attachment to competition clothing by either adhesive or pins. The method of attachment should be supplied if necessary. Refer to [Section 11](#) in regard to sponsorship regulations.

### **6.10 Target Supplies.**

An early assessment and ordering of approved targets should be undertaken. Shipping from Europe can take four months when the championship is being held in the southern summer. A firm order should be placed at least six months prior to competition.

### **6.11 Target Approval Procedures.**

#### **6.11.1 ISSF & ISCD events**

The targets utilised in all ISSF events must be purchased from an approved ISSF supplier, or alternatively, should local production be contemplated, then samples of the local print must be submitted to the ISSF for measuring and approval. This procedure can take an extended period and it is suggested that appropriate samples are forwarded at an early date. A Minimum of 25 targets of each type must be submitted for examination.

#### **6.11.2 Non-ISSF/ISCD events**

### **6.12 Drug Testing Facilities.**

The drug testing programme, as approved by the ISSF and NSDA, needs to be conducted in a specially allocated facility.

The minimum requirement is:

- A comfortable waiting area with facility to keep a supply of drinks cold and under security. Where space is at a premium, a lockable caravan would be suitable as a waiting area provided it is ventilated or air conditioned where appropriate.
- Separate toilet facilities for taking of samples. These facilities must be able to accommodate at least two persons.

### **6.13 Accommodation.**

University / Hostel type accommodation of a reasonable standard is all that is required for most competitors and officials. However, should a time of year be selected when extreme conditions are likely, air conditioned facilities should be offered. In the organisational plan provided to the Oceania Shooting Federation, one year pre - competition, details of accommodation and cost should be provided. Care should be taken to ensure adequate laundry facilities are available with supplies of laundry powder supplied or available for purchase. Where possible, a level of separation should be considered between athletes and technical officials as they tend to meet well into the evenings and could create an unnecessary disturbance to the athletes. Precise information should be provided to participant countries on when and to whom payment is required and the methods of payment that is acceptable. Payment must be GST inclusive (if applicable) and free of any bank or transfer charges.

### **6.14 Armoury Facilities**

## **6.15 Disabled Access**

Arrangements must be made on all sites to ensure the access of disabled competitors, officials and members of the public.

## **6.16 Meal Times**

Where centralised accommodation is available, thought needs to be given to the times that meals will be served, in particular breakfast. Many of the competitions commence at 9 am and therefore many of the competitors wish to be at the range by 8 am. If substantial travel time is required to the venue, breakfast may need to be planned for an early start. Thought must also be given to the provision of late meals. The structure of the Championships requires a late finish from time to time. This can be further complicated by the time necessary to complete Drug Testing, protests etc

Special arrangements required of the accommodation authorities may need to be notified well in advance.

## **6.17 Bar Facilities.**

The provision of bar facilities during the evenings to cater, in particular for officials, volunteers and guests is worthwhile and an opportunity to raise revenue.

## **6.18 Medal Ceremonies.**

It is for the organising committee to arrange the style and venue for medal ceremonies to suit their own occasion. It is suggested however that early consideration be given to a list of guest presenters who are important to the sport. Politicians, City Mayors etc. often need to be booked several months in advance. Refer Protocol - Section 5 It is recommended that during this function, in Quota Place years, the winners of the quota places be presented to the audience as an acknowledgement of their achievement for their country.

## **6.19 Opening / Closing Ceremonies.**

The style and format of opening/closing ceremonies / function should also be considered. There would seem to be a preference for a reasonably informal function with entertainment rather than a formal dinner function.

## **6.20 Publicity.**

Every endeavour should be made to achieve maximum exposure for our sport in the media. The early appointment of a media liaison person should be arranged as a specialist position, preferably a person with knowledge and skill in this area. Television may need as much as 12 months notice of the event if they are to programme the event into their schedule.

## **6.21 Import / Export Requirements.**

With the changing scene on firearms, the movement of the necessary equipment for competition needs particular care and attention.

Little difficulty should be experienced however, providing early consultations with the appropriate authorities are undertaken well in advance.

It is recommended:

Twelve months prior to competition:

- direct consultation is held with the local authorities to establish the precise requirements on the import, storage and re-export of firearms.
- Known requirements to be advised to all countries at the time of seeking preliminary entries (nine months member Federations / six months guest countries).

Prior to arrival in the country, participants should receive precise information on the procedures to be followed on arrival and departure of delegations.

This information should include:

- Whether they will be welcomed at the Airport.

- Detail of firearm clearance and whether specific delivery and storage arrangements are in place.
- Transport arrangements.

Establishment of a centralised storage facility should be included in the plan of arrangements.

Early allocation of manpower.

The following services should be considered:

- Reception at airport, assistance with clearance of licensing and transport of firearms to secure facility.
- Management of secure facility for the full period of the championship. It should be noted that there is a requirement to have access to the facility from 0700 hrs to 2000 hrs daily.
- A system of lodging and issuing firearms needs to be established to ensure that at the end of each day, all firearms are accounted for.
- It is suggested that the system be tied to the room keys where centralised accommodation is provided. This can best be handled by the competitor handing in their keys to take possession of their firearms.

Disbursement of the firearms at the end of competition needs planning as many flights out of the host country could leave early. The additional time requirements to clear the firearms with the authorities prior to departure could indicate a very early start.

SPECIAL NOTE: Participant Federations equally should not ignore the changing scene in their home country regarding the export and re-import of firearms and equipment.

## **6.22 Visa Requirements.**

Full information needs to be supplied by the Organising Committee to member and guest Federations as to the Visa requirements necessary for participants to enter the host country.

## **6.23 Air Travel Concessions.**

The Organising Committee should give early consideration to seeking air travel concessions for all teams and officials. These are achievable if work is commenced early enough.

## **6.24 Transport.**

Availability of hire vans, cars etc should be negotiated with a local company at an early date and preliminary requirements sought from member and guest Federations. It is vital to inform guest countries of the requirement to obtain their own transport if it is not being supplied, as they would have an expectation of a shuttle service operating.

## **6.25 Transport - Arrivals.**

Transport to and from arrival / departure terminals may need to be arranged.

## **6.26 Drivers.**

It should not be assumed that guests could drive their own vehicles. They are unlikely to have suitable drivers and in addition may have little local language. Volunteer drivers will need to be arranged to assist these teams with travel as necessary.

## **6.27 Official Language.**

The official language of the championships will be English and as such should be advised to visiting teams.

## **6.28 Interpreters.**

An interpretation service may be necessary. Approaches to local language students could be a most welcome opportunity to exchange skills.

## **6.29 Competitor Packs**

Competitor packs are a useful method of delivering a variety of event and tourist material, together with any sponsor products etc. It is further suggested that full details of any marketed products and prices are provided within the packs to ensure everyone is fully aware of availability and where they can be obtained. Such packs should be supplied to all competitors, team and technical officials as they register on arrival.

### **6.30 Marketing Opportunities.**

Considerable opportunities exist to market a variety of goods and apparel associated with the championship. Items such as sweatshirts, T shirts, badges etc are usually in demand from those participating. Limited supplies of other souvenirs are equally marketable. Particular arrangements are necessary to enable access, at all sites, to these goods.

### **6.31 Ammunition and Reloading Powder Sales.**

The availability of ammunition and reloading powders, including pricing should be advised to countries as they seek entry. This will be of considerable assistance in particular to those travelling on international airlines. Shotgun ammunition creates particular concern in relation to excess baggage cost. Details of local laws governing the possession, carriage and export of ammunition should be provided. A reloading service may well be offered, in particular for 300m.

### **6.32 Range Catering requirements**

The availability of suitable food and refreshments at the range facilities needs careful study. Dependent on accommodation arrangements, it is likely that substantial supplies of lunches and other refreshments will be required.

### **6.33 Meeting Rooms.**

A number of major meetings will be held during the course of the championship comprising of team, technical and administrative. Therefore, adequate rooms will need to be available to cope with the requirements.

### **6.34 Trade Displays.**

Consideration should be given to providing the opportunity for Trade Displays relevant to the sport, where possible promoting items that are developed, manufactured or unique to the Oceania Region.

### **6.35 Directory Boards / Location Maps.**

It is recommended that suitable maps are displayed at the operations centre and other sites, of the location of venues (and instructions where necessary) to assist teams and officials.

### **6.36 Currency Exchange**

Information should be provided in competitor packs, on currency exchange arrangements including local and convenient locations to undertake such transactions.

### **6.37 Medical Treatment**

Medical assistance is not necessarily required on site, however detail of emergency services or doctors on duty should be widely available.

### **6.38 Insurance Implications**

For some countries, the implications of Insurance claims for damage or negligence need to be considered. Confirmation must be provided to the Oceania Federation, that the Organising Committee has adequate insurance coverage in respect of public and personal injury liability to ensure the National and Oceania Federations are not exposed to litigation.

## **7 PERSONNEL**

### **7.1 Personnel Plan**

### **7.2 Function Description**

#### **7.2.1 Oceania Championship Director.**

Appointed by the Host Federation to direct the running of the Championships. The Director will chair the Championship Organising Committee and has overall responsibility for the management of the Championships including the approval of all expenditure.

#### **7.2.2 Championship Manager.**

The Championship Manager is responsible for the co-ordination and management of all activities required to run the championship other than the "on range" activities of the disciplines. These responsibilities include:

- Accommodation.
- Transportation.
- Medals and Trophies.
- Drug Testing.
- Import / Export of firearms.
- Communications.
- Opening / Closing Ceremonies and other official meetings.
- Award Ceremonies.
- Co-ordination and arrangements for media and publicity.
- Set up of administrative facilities.
- Set up of results service.
- Co-ordination of Shooting Committee.
- Co-ordination with Office Manager.
- Co-ordination of all official guests.

#### **7.2.3 Championship Shooting Committee.**

A Championship Committee, involving the various disciplines represented at the Championship, should be appointed. The critical position is that of Convenor of that committee who will be responsible to the Championship Director for the overall management of the shooting events. These responsibilities includes:

- Convening and chairing meetings of the Shooting Committee.
- Reporting to the host Federation on progress of each disciplines preparations.
- Co-ordinating with the Discipline Directors to ensure all cross discipline requirements and issues are addressed and resolved.
- Co-ordinating with the Championship Manager to ensure that "off range" requirements and issues affecting the conduct of shooting events are resolved.
- Ensuring that requirements for funds from the Host Federation are raised promptly, supported by details of the requirements and alternatives.

#### **7.2.4 Championship Secretary.**

The Championship Secretary is responsible for inter - association and international communications relating to the Championships, and for arranging and documenting Organising Committee meetings.

These responsibilities include:

- Sending invitations to all Full and Associate Federations, and guest countries in accordance with the time - line (see 4.1).
- Keeping all participating countries informed of progress and status of championship preparations.
- Keeping all associations informed of progress and status of championship preparations.
- Receiving and responding to queries from associations and countries.
- Receiving and managing the entries according to time - line (see 4.1).
- Co-ordinating with the Office Manager on accommodation bookings.

- Supporting the Office Manager during the championship.
- Airport Reception Co-ordination.

#### **7.2.5 Championship Office Manager.**

The Championship Office Manager is responsible for the running of the administration office during the period of the championship. These responsibilities include:

- Ensuring the office is attended during the required and agreed hours.
- Managing all bookings for accommodation.
- Co-ordinating with accommodation authorities during the championship on accommodation bookings and requirements.
- Ensure that all queries and requests for assistance from team management are received, handled or referred.
- Ensure that there is a process in place to receive all payments for accommodation, supplies and souvenirs.
- Maintain accounting records, balance and account for all monies received and paid.
- Receive, record, collate and publish all results and verify medal winners.
- Prepare and distribute team and competitive packs.
- Manage team and competitor registrations and receive registration fees.

#### **7.2.6 Technical Adviser.**

The Technical Adviser will support the Organising Committee by providing experienced guidance during the organising phase. During the championship itself, the Technical Adviser will support the Organising Committee by fielding and resolving issues, which arise, particularly in connection with overseas teams or shooting programmes. The Technical Adviser will work closely with the Championship Manager. These responsibilities include:

- Coordination with the ISSF Technical Delegate to ensure the championship meets ISSF requirements.
- Coordination of classification office function.
- Coordination of equipment certification function.
- Coordination and appointment of Technical Jury staff.
- Coordination and appointment of Jury of Appeal.

#### **7.2.7 Championship Treasurer.**

The Championship Treasurer is responsible for supporting the Organising Committee in preparation of budgets and costs for the championship. The Championship Treasurer will work with the Office Manager to ensure that effective controls are established, and will receive all funds collected and report to the Organising Committee and Host Federation on championship results.

#### **7.2.8 Results Co-ordinator.**

Experience shows that the co-ordination of entry information, squadding arrangements, results production, distribution and dissemination requires a dedicated person to properly service these requirements. There is a constant demand for this information through out the Championship and Management staff does not have the time necessary to dedicate to this activity.

#### **7.2.9 Office Support and Souvenirs.**

This appointee is the primary support person to the Office Manager and is also responsible for:

- Identifying suitable souvenirs for sale during the championship.
- Recommending quantities, costs and prices.
- Gaining approval for purchase.
- Purchasing and managing stock and maintaining records of sales and income.

#### **7.2.10 Discipline Directors.**

The Discipline Directors as a group make up the Shooting Committee under the chairmanship of the convenor. Each Discipline Director is responsible for ALL "on range" matters relating to the conduct of events for their discipline.

These responsibilities include:

- Arranging and booking of venues for the events.
- Arranging and scheduling the staff for the events.
- Developing budgets for their events and managing costs to these budgets.
- Gaining approval from the Organising Committee, through the Championship Manager, for any work or expenditure which may require Host Federation or championship funds.
- Ensuring that all facilities are up to international standards.
- Ensuring that all equipment is operational and support is in place, in case of difficulties during events.
- Ordering of all targets and supplies at least six months prior to the championship.
- Provision of toilet facilities for men and women.
- Provision of target security/delivery to classification office for results recording.
- Ensuring that access to the facilities is maintained as required.
- Ensuring security of the facilities.
- Ensuring provision of suitable security for firearms and equipment.

### **7.3 Manpower Planning.**

The championship will not operate without the input from an extensive number of volunteers. Therefore a particular effort should be made to ensure that their services are recognised in a proper manner. Such acknowledgement will be limited by budgetary constraints, but history shows this does not need to be extensive. It is important an effort is made however.

#### **7.3.1 Manpower Plan.**

A full manpower plan needs to be developed, to ensure all requirements are met. See Section 14 for details.

#### **7.3.2 Volunteers**

##### **Volunteer Acknowledgement.**

It is suggested that a "Certificate of Participation" be produced for voluntary staff. In addition it may be possible to provide a commemorative badge and should it be available, a championship T shirt or cap. The Organising Committee should pay particular attention to this aspect. Many of the volunteers have special skills that are vital to the sport and their continued support must be maintained.

##### **Volunteer Refreshments.**

It is important that adequate advice is provided to all volunteers as to the level and location of refreshments that will be provided to them. It is required that, as a minimum, tea and coffee are provided for in the budget. If lunches are not provided to the volunteers, then an ordering system must be arranged, particularly for those who are in areas such as Classification. The workload often requires long hours of attendance and their needs must be addressed.

#### **7.3.3 Personal Identification**

A system of personal identification should be provided for all those involved in the Championship. Each group of participants i.e Competitors, Organising Committee, Technical Official, Range Volunteers should be colour coded to enable appropriate identification and access where necessary. The system does not need to be elaborate or expensive. Coloured card, appropriately named and identified, heat sealed and able to be pinned to clothing is all that is necessary.

#### **7.3.4 Staff Identification**

It is necessary to establish a method of operational staff identification to ensure clear definition of role and reduce confusion. General Range Volunteers - recommended a distinctive Cap be provided. Range Officers and Jury - A bright coloured jerkin or top be provided in various colours to identify each position

#### **7.3.5 Range Staff Meetings:**

It is important for Range Directors, to appreciate that , as Oceania is equally a training ground for Technical Staff, many inexperienced staff will be confused as to precisely what their role will

be. Although much detail is discussed at the Technical Meeting prior to competition, this is insufficient guidance to inexperienced personnel. A full range meeting should be arranged by each discipline to ensure full direction is given to ensure the smooth running of the Championship.

---

## **8 RANGES & FACILITIES**

### **8.1 Range Shelter.**

Each venue and event will need to be assessed for its own requirements as regards shelter. As a minimum, there needs to be adequate facilities for athletes to remove themselves, and their equipment, from the adverse conditions of sun or rain. A marquee is considered adequate. For competition purposes, if possible, shelter should be provided to enable a high standard of performance to be achieved.

### **8.2 Toilet Facilities**

The provision of both male and female toilets is required at all sites within reasonable walking distances of the range facilities including practice days.

Sufficient 'disabled' toilet facilities must be available at venues for ISCD events.

### **8.3 Water / Refreshments**

The provision of adequate facilities to enable competitors to secure refreshments is required. Should events be held in isolated areas, particular attention to this requirement should be taken. The consumption of water is usually at high levels and chilled or bottled water should be available at each site.

### **8.4 Range Parking.**

An evaluation needs to be undertaken at all sites as to the availability of adequate parking, bearing in mind that most competitors will be traveling in hire - vans. The requirement could be extensive at some venues. Volunteer/s should be allocated to control the parking arrangements and assist where possible in ensuring adequate access / egress is available. Special thought needs to be given to the volunteers, in particular those who are not young in years but are giving long hours to assist the championship. Their needs may override that of the competitors.

Range Emergency Access.

Particular attention is needed to access / egress for emergency purposes. A colour coding system of vehicle identification may need to be instituted.

### **8.5 Communications**

The availability of adequate communication systems must be considered. Each site should be equipped with a telephone as a minimum (Cellular phones are acceptable if there is no alternative). For major sites, separate telephone and facsimile lines should be available for administrative purposes with separate facilities available to competitors and the public. The installation of a temporary pay phone could be considered as a way of controlling costs. Communications are to be supplied at the cost of the Organising Committee for both the Technical Delegate and the Oceania President to ensure contact with all ranges and facilities. This may be either as Cellphones or pagers.

### **8.6 Flags and Flag Poles.**

To ensure the championship assumes an international flavour, it is important to ensure participant country flags are flown at all venues used in the Championship. The number of flag poles need to be considered with one per country preferred.

### **8.7 Range Directions / Signage**

Though should be given to appropriate roadside signage to direct traffic and develop further interest in the Championship. Care needs to be taken not to exceed local authority bylaws.

### **8.8 Airgun Supplies**

A supply of CO<sub>2</sub> gas and compressed air will be needed for the Air Gun competitors. The location and availability of this supply should be announced at the Technical meeting, posted at

venues and advised in the competitor packs. The supply cylinder should be fitted with a draft tube and all competitors should be advised that they need to supply their own adapters.

### **8.9 Gunsmith Services.**

Although not necessary to have a gunsmith on site, arrangements should be made with local expertise to be on call. This information should be advised in the competitor packs.

### **8.10 Range Safety**

The safety of all participants, visitors and spectators are of prime concern and all endeavours must be made by the Organising Committee to ensure all risks are eliminated or minimised. This may involve the assumption of all control and responsibility for range areas, where club activities may be held in conjunction with the championship.

### **8.11 Spectator Safety**

Signs should be displayed advising all persons that it is strongly advised that excessive noise may be encountered on or near the shooting ranges and that suitable hearing protection should be worn by all persons. Protective ear plugs should be made available, for sale to the public as well as made available to the range staff as is provided for in the ISSF Rules.

## **9 TECHNICAL**

### **9.1 ISSF Technical Delegate.**

Eighteen months prior to a championship, application needs to be made to the ISSF for the appointment of a Technical Delegate.. The appointee is responsible for all technical aspects of the championship. Should the organising committee have a specific person in mind, such a suggestion should be placed before the ISSF at that time.

#### **9.1.1 Technical Delegate Costs.**

The organising committee will be responsible for the expenses of the Technical Delegate, including travel, accommodation, meals, ground transport and daily allowance. Such costs need to be included in the championship budget.

### **9.2 Range Inspection and Certification.**

It will be the function of the Technical Delegate in conjunction with the Technical Adviser to inspect all ranges to be used in the championship as to their conformity with the standards of the ISSF and to certify their acceptability for the championship to proceed. Without such certification, ISSF OLYMPIC MQS and ISSF Olympic Quota places cannot be awarded. Early contact with the Technical Delegate is necessary to ensure a visit to the ranges and this is recommended 12 months pre - competition. The Technical Delegate will be responsible to inspect and approve all range facilities for the conduct of ISSF events, and receive advice on the suitability of ranges used in Non-ISSF events from the relevant Discipline Directors.

### **9.3 Appointment of Chairman of Jury and Jury members.**

It is recommended that these appointments are undertaken early, in accordance with the established time - line (see Section 4). The ISSF rules on Jury numbers are as follows:

- ISSF Rifle Jury Chairman and 2-6 members.
- ISSF Pistol Jury Chairman and 2-6 members.
- ISSF Shotgun Jury Chairman and 4-8 members.
- ISSF Classification Jury Chairman and 2-6 members.
- Jury of Appeal Chairman and 2 members. (one of the members (other than the Chairman) should be from the National Federation organising the Championship.)
- 300m Jury Chairman and 2 members
- Fullbore Jury Chairman and 2 members.
- Non ISSF Events 1 person Two Juries may be combined providing the events are not run concurrently.

#### **9.3.1 Application for Technical Committees.**

The organising committee should seek applications from prospective Jury members some 12 months pre - competition. This should be by form of application (see Form 3). The development of Jury members Technical Officials is seen as vital to the health of the sport. It is important to provide as wide an opportunity as possible for those wishing to participate.

#### **9.3.2 Acceptance of Jury Members.**

Formal advice of acceptance should be forwarded to all selected officials at least six months ahead of the championship, indicating the functions they will perform and what, if any, assistance will be provided to them in relation to travel, accommodation etc.

### **9.4 Range Officers.**

In selection of technical and volunteer staff, special consideration must be given to the competence of range officers. It is preferable to seek well experienced individuals who have a known ability to conduct the matches in a manner compatible with the event.

### **9.5 Technical Meetings.**

A formal technical meeting needs to be held prior to the opening of the championship. This would normally be conducted at least 24 hours prior to the opening event. The purpose of the meeting is

to provide an opportunity for team leaders, technical officials and venue directors to be finally briefed on the conduct of the championship and to deal with any particular problems (see Appendix A for sample agenda). In the event of a competition being held in a remote location or at other times, an event specific technical meeting will be held at the range site.

## 9.6 Squadding Procedures.

Event squads for the Championship are drawn by ballot, on the following basis:

One Ballot for both Individual and Team competitions.

Ballot for the Oceania Championship will be for individual competitors, having due regard for the equal distribution of Team members in squads as per the ISSF Rules.

Ballot for the Oceania Grand Prix Championship will be for Individual and Team competition

Each category within an event will be balloted separately to ensure all competitors in a category are squadded as near as is possible together. Where squadding is undertaken by computer selection, such process must be approved by the Technical Delegate and conducted in the presence of a delegated Jury member.

Recommended Draw method for Mound/Bay allocation

Background:

Previous experience has shown that it is necessary to draw the competitors by name (or competitor number) into the bays/mound positions, at the one occasion, before the commencement of the competition. It is recommended this be conducted immediately following the Technical Meeting which is normally held 2 days prior to the commencement of competition. Should changes occur to conditions, or competitors later in the competition, adjustments or a further draw can be conducted by the Jury Members. The purpose of this exercise is to ease the administrative effort in relation to range details, score sheets etc.

Method:

On occasions where a suitable computer program is not available to produce a random draw, the following procedure is to be used. The process is conducted by the appointed Jury members and takes place in the presence of Team officials who care to attend. The start position and competitor are drawn consecutively, one competitor at a time, and recorded as they are drawn.

Equipment

Small Cards, Plastic Buttons or similar - marked with competitor names and/or numbers.

Similar Cards or buttons marked with Bay/Mound numbers.

Where the mound will accommodate all competitors in one detail, the draw for start position is made from the middle position on the range and progressively working outwards.

Recording sheet - see Form No 40. Appendix A

Two cloth (or paper) bags.

Table and chairs for three persons.

Procedure.

All the name cards are checked off against the competitor list, then placed in one bag. All bay/mound cards are placed in the other bag. The 3 Jury members operated in unison. One recording the outcome, one drawing the competitor from a bag and the other drawing a bay/mound. The Bay/mound is drawn, followed by the competitor and placed in front of the recorder. All drawn names and bay/mounds are left face up on the table until completion. It is possible to reuse name cards as further events are drawn, however it is prudent to have complete sets prepared for all events to ensure no confusion. If the event requires a number of squads' e.g.: Rapid Fire Pistol, the recording sheet would be prepared showing the number of bays available. The draw proceeds, filling up each detail until all competitors are accommodated. Example - 4 shooting bays and 15 competitors. Name cards for all competitors prepared but only 4 bay numbers utilised.

Teams

If the competition is to be conducted in more than one relay, care must be taken to ensure competitors from each country are spread evenly between relays.

Equipment Control.

The manning of equipment control can be undertaken by suitably experienced personnel, however at least one Jury member must be present during all inspections. The provision of

inspection equipment and stickers are the responsibility of the organising committee. Refer Section 12 for full details.

#### Advertising on Competitor Clothing.

The ISSF, in conjunction with the IOC, have mandated limitations of advertising on competitor clothing and equipment. As this championship is sanctioned by the ISSF, we have a responsibility to implement those regulations. Although the regulations only strictly apply to the ISSF events, for consistency these regulations shall apply to all disciplines conducted (see Section 11).

### **9.7 Results Service.**

There is a need to provide a timely and accurate results service to the competitors, Federations and particularly to the ISSF.

It is preferable that a computerised score programme be used to process the results to ensure an adequate style of presentation and accuracy. Computerised scoring must be used for Oceania IISF and ISCD events.

Hard copy of all results should be maintained in the event of computer failure. If nothing is available, The New Zealand Shooting Federation has an adequate system available. Equipment required: IBM compatible computer.

It is considered necessary to have a facsimile machine and/or Email link at main sites for transmission of results to the operations centre.

#### **9.7.1 ISSF/ISCD Results Format**

ISSF results format must be used for ISSF and ISCD events (current information from the ISSF and/or Technical Delegate).

Results format for electronic transmission each day of results to ISSF Headquarters must meet format specified by the ISSF.

#### **9.7.2 Non-ISSF/ISCD Results Format**

Wherever possible the results presentation for non-ISSF/ISCD events should meet the requirements of the ISSF results format.

Non-ISSF events results format

#### **9.7.3 Results Posting.**

Adequate notice boards are required to post results at all sites and the operations centre. It should be clearly stated in the Championship instructions, where Official results will be posted to ensure no confusion over Protest requirements.

### **9.8 Jury Rooms.**

Provision needs to be made to have suitable meeting facilities at each range for Jury members to meet.

### **9.9 Internal Range Communications:**

Specific arrangements should be made to ensure the communication systems on the range are adequate for the conduct of such championships. In particular, the Fullbore Rifle and 300m Rifle arrangements need confirmation of their quality and reliability.

---

## 10 APPROVED EVENTS

The approved events for conduct at the Oceania and Oceania Grand Prix Shooting Championship are as detailed in this section.

### 10.1 Mandatory Events.-See 10.6.1 –

It is mandatory that all Olympic Games and Paralympics events be included in the Oceania Championship programme subject to Rule Minimum Number of Individual Competitors.. In the event of insufficient entries, the event will be withdrawn.

### 10.2 Other Events.-See 10.6.2

All other events shown in this section are approved for competition and can be conducted subject to adequate facilities and operational personnel being available.

### 10.3 New Competition Events

See Section 5.6.

### 10.4 Demonstration Events

The host Federation is free to include within the programme, demonstration events for the purpose of development or promotion of a discipline. It is however the responsibility of the hosts to ensure such events do not impinge on the overall performance and conduct of the championship. No championship medals or privileges will be accorded these events.

### 10.5 Competition Structure

Each shooting discipline shall be entitled to conduct a Teams and Individual Championship utilising the Individual scores to determine the outcome for Teams events. In the case of elimination matches being necessary, the individual scores from the elimination series will be used to determine the Team Championship

### 10.6 Badge Matches

Badge matches will not be conducted.

## **11 ISSF/ISCD DECLARATIONS and IOC/IPC ELIGIBILITY RULES**

See Appendix D for full details. These Rules apply equally to all competitors in both the Oceania Championship and Oceania Grand Prix events unless specific provision is made within this Manual.

---

## **12 CERTIFICATION**

### **12.1 EQUIPMENT INSPECTION**

#### **12.1.1 Inspection Area.**

It will be necessary to establish a facility for the implementation of inspection procedures to ensure compliance with ISSF or other International Regulations on all firearms, aids and competitor clothing.

#### **12.1.2 Location of Inspection Area.**

Dependent on location of range/s it may be possible to establish a centralised facility, which is desirable, however other venues may need to be covered. Such facilities need to be in place at least two days prior to competition commencing, and experience shows the necessity to have this operation manned for approximately the first two days of competition to allow for the arrival of all participants, re-inspections etc.

#### **12.1.3 Manpower Requirements.**

It is desirable that holders of an ISSF Judges License are available to conduct inspections. However if this is not possible suitably experienced staff could conduct these inspections. An appointed Jury Member should be present to supervise inspections.

#### **12.1.4 Documentation.**

It is desirable that a standardised inspection form be used to provide consistency and recognisable to range staff if further inquiry is required. See Appendix A for suggested form.

#### **12.1.5 Certification Sticker/s.**

The Organising Committee should budget for the production of an inspection approved sticker that is suitable for attachment to all items so inspected. These should be unique to each championship and retained under security.

#### **12.1.6 Equipment Certification Equipment.**

Each discipline has its own unique requirements that need attention. The following list is accumulative.

##### **12.1.6.1 ISSF & ISCD Pistol Disciplines:**

- Measuring Boxes for checking dimensions of Pistols.
  - A box, 300 x 150 x 50mm for 25M events ( +1 - 0 mm manufacturing tolerance).
  - A box, 400 x 200 x 50 mm for Air Pistols.
- 500g trigger pull weight.
- 1000g trigger pull weight.
- 1360g trigger pull weight
- Certified weighing scale ( preferably electronic )
- Ruler or template to check sighting radius, barrel length and barrel height of pistols.
- Chronograph for Rapid Fire Pistol ammunition velocity
- Electronic scales for Rapid Fire Pistol projectile weight

##### **12.1.6.2 ISSF Rifle Disciplines.:**

- Template Board will be used for all measurements for 300m, 50m and 10mr Rifles as specified in ISSF STR Figure 9.
- Certified Weighing Scales (preferably electronic) with a rated capacity of 10kgs.
- Weight of 1500g for trigger testing of 300m Standard Rifles
- Rule (Tape Measure)
- Material thickness gauge - to measure thickness of clothing and footwear.
- Measuring device to measure the overlap at the closure of the Shooting Jacket.
- Measuring device to measure the stiffness of clothing
- 40mm gauge Measure width of belt and sling.
- Cylindrical tube with a depth of 25cm and an external diameter of 18cm.

### 12.1.6.3 ISCD Rifle Disciplines – in addition to ISSF Rifle, above:

- Electronic scales for pellet weight

## 12.2 Recommended Equipment Control Procedures.

It is the responsibility of the shooter to present themselves with all equipment that they will use in competition.

### 12.2.1 Rifle

The manning of Equipment Control, at least at peak times, should consist of 5 qualified officials, supervised by a member of the Jury.

It is recommended that the layout and work of the section operates on the principle of a conveyor line.

- The first member of the section enters checks all necessary data in the shooters control card and it is essential to have this card ready.
- The next member controls the shooters trousers and jacket.
- The third member controls the rifles.
- The fourth member controls the shoes, gloves, slings and kneeling rolls.
- The fifth member marks the rifles and clothing and countersigns the control card.
- It is advised that at least one member of equipment control section be a female.

### 12.2.2 Pistol

The manning of Equipment Control, at least at peak times, should consist of 3 qualified officials, supervised by a member of the Jury.

It is recommended that the layout and work of the section operates on the principle of a conveyor line.

- The first member of the section enters checks all necessary data in the shooters control card and it is essential to have this card ready.
  - The next member controls checking of size, weight and curvatures
  - The third member controls the trigger weighing, shoes, marks the pistols and clothing and countersigns the control card.

## **13 DATA**

### **13.1 EVENT RULES – Non ISSF**

#### **13.1.1 Muzzle Loading Events**

MLAIC – refer moribund events [10.6.3](#).

#### **13.1.2 NRA. ACTION PISTOL**

##### **13.1.2.1 Shooting Regulations.**

These events are conducted in accordance with the NATIONAL RIFLE ASSOCIATION OF AMERICA "ACTION PISTOL SHOOTING RULES". as regards technical rules and general rules in accordance with the Oceania and Oceania Grand Prix Shooting Championship Manual other than for the following exceptions.

##### **13.1.2.2 Championship Jurisdiction.**

This championship is sanctioned and conducted by the OSF and retains status within that championship only.

##### **13.1.2.3 Type of Tournament.**

International Match. Arranged by the OSF and recognised by the member Federations of the Oceania Region. Officials are appointed by the Organising Committee.

##### **13.1.2.4 Type of Match.**

A match in which participation is limited to those competitors from within the region and invited guests.

##### **13.1.2.5 Targets.**

As agreed by the Technical Committee of the Oceania Shooting Federation.

##### **13.1.2.6 Courses of Fire.**

The course of fire for the Oceania Grand Prix Shooting Championship will be selected from the NRA matches detailed in these rules. The course of fire will be determined and advised six months prior to competition.

##### **13.1.2.7 Arbitration.**

All rules interpretation will be handled by the Match Director and all protests handled by the Oceania Jury. The only recourse will be by appeal to the Oceania Jury of Appeal whose decision will be final and binding. All such actions must be presented in writing. Protest and appeal fees will be determined by the Organising Committee and will only be refundable should that appeal be successful. All protests must be submitted to the Jury member supervising the event within 30 minutes of posting of the results. Appeal to the Jury of Appeal must be submitted within 60 minutes of the protest decision being issued.

##### **13.1.2.8 Tournament Officials.**

The tournament officials listed in the NRA Rules may not be necessary for the conduct of the championship. The Organising Committee will be responsible to ensure adequate competent/qualified personnel are available to conduct the championship. The following is seen as a recommended minimum:

Match Director.

Jury Member.

Chief Range Officer.

Range Officer.

Target Officers.

##### **13.1.2.9 Holster Restrictions.**

The Match Director may impose additional holster restrictions as published from time to time to meet local safety conditions.

##### **13.1.2.10 Load Testing.**

Loads shall be tested through the competitor's own pistol that has been submitted for certification for this championship.

#### **13.1.2.11 Eye Protection.**

The wearing of eye protection is mandatory for all persons in the vicinity of the firing area during this championship.

#### **13.1.2.12 Oceania Grand Prix Records.**

Oceania Grand Prix records may be established by Teams and Individuals in this Championship who are eligible for Oceania Grand Prix medals. This event is conducted consistent with the rules of Full - Bore Target Rifle events of the Commonwealth Games as defined in the RULES OF THE COMMONWEALTH SHOOTING FEDERATION 7.62 QUEENS PRIZE FULLBORE RULES as regards technical rules and the Oceania and Oceania Grand Prix Championship Operating Manual as regards general rules other than the following exceptions.

##### **13.1.9.2 Championship Jurisdiction.**

This Championship is sanctioned and conducted by the OSF and retains status within that championship only.

##### **13.1.9.3 Events.**

Teams Championship.  
Individual Championship.

##### **13.1.9.4 Participant Limitations.**

The maximum number of individual competitors permitted to compete will not be less than the total number of competitors in the Teams Championship.

##### **13.1.9.5 Match - Individual.**

Stage One:  
Distances: 300, 500 and 600 yds.  
Number of Shots: Seven counting shots at each range.

Stage Two.  
Distances 300, 500 and 600 yds.  
Number of shots: 10 counting shots at each range.  
Stage Three.  
Distances 900 and 1000 yds.  
Number of shots: 15 counting shots at each range.

Sighting Shots: Each competitor will fire two non - convertible sighting shots at each range.  
Range Exception:  
Where the host country is not able to provide a range where 900 and 1000 yds are available. Stage Three will be omitted and the number of counting shots for Stage One will be increased to Ten.

#### **13.1.9.6 Squadding:**

Competitors may be squadded in pairs or three's taking care as far as possible that competitors from the same country are not squadded together. Each member of a squad will shoot alternatively commencing with the right most shooter on the mound. Time: The time allowed for a competitor to fire each shot is 45 seconds timed in the case of the first shot from the order to commence and from the time that the target is clear on all subsequent shots. Scoring: Squad members will score for each other with each member taking the score of the competitor whom immediately follow them. The scorer will call the shot and the competitor will immediately call the target clear or raise a challenge.

#### **13.1.9.7 Match - Teams.**

Distances: 300, 600, 900 and 1000 yds.  
Number of shots: Ten counting shots at each range.  
Each competitor will shoot two non - convertible sighting shots at each range.

#### **13.1.9.8 Range Exceptions:**

Where the hosting country is not able to provide a range where 900 and 1000 yds are available, the match will consist of two 10 shot matches at 300 and 600 yds. Squadding: Each Team will be squadded together on one target. Each member may be coached by another member of the team and all three members may confer. The team may not receive advice or guidance from any other person. Time: The time limit for each team will be 45 minutes for 300, 500 and 600 yds and 60 minutes for 900 and 1000 yds.

#### **13.1.9.9 Shooting Equipment.**

All rifles, clothing and other shooting equipment will comply with the rules for full - bore target rifle competition of the host country. However the host country may, at its discretion, permit competitors from other countries to use specific equipment which conforms to the competitor's home association.

#### **13.1.9.10 Ammunition.**

The ammunition to be used in the Oceania Championship, both Individual and Team, will be .308 Win / 7.62 Nato and will be furnished by each individual and team respectively. The ammunition may be either handloads or may be purchased commercially. The bullet must be the 155 grain Palma Bullet manufactured by SEIRRA THE BULLETSMITHS. The cartridge case must be the .308 Win / 7.62 Nato as specified by the dimensions set down by The Small Arms and Ammunition Manufacturers Institute (SAMMI) or (CIP). The cartridge case, primer and powder may be of any manufacture. The ammunition must be loaded in a manner consistent with the ammunition industry's accepted standards of safety. Any change in bullet type or weight must be approved by the Oceania Shooting Federation. During the individual or teams championship, a competitor or a competitor with a team may be required to provide at least two rounds, and not more than five (at random) to members of the Jury for technical checks. Therefore, all competitors should ensure they have more than the required number of rounds for each match to allow for samples to be collected. Failure of any competitor to comply with these standards will result in the following action:

For the Individual Championship:

On confirmation of a violation, immediate disqualification from the matches and notification of the details in writing to the Championship Director.

For the Teams matches:

Disallowing all scores achieved by the individual up to that point in the matches;  
Immediate disqualification from further participation and substitution of a reserve member of that team Participating countries must advise the host country at the time of submitting preliminary entries if they require to purchase ammunition on arrival. This advice must include specific quantity for which the host may request payment in part or full at the time of an order being placed.

Targets will be as per the host country association.

## **APPENDIX D - ISSF DECLARATIONS**

### 11.1 Arbitration Agreement.

The Arbitration Agreement (see Form 4) must be completed by all participants in events conducted by the Oceania Shooting Federation, before the commencement of competition.

11.2 Team Management Responsibility. It will be required of the head of each Delegation, to present to the Technical Meeting all signed copies of this agreement, with declaration attached that all competitors in the delegation have completed the arbitration agreement.

11.3 Organising Committee Responsibility. The completion of this Arbitration Agreement is mandated by the ISSF for all competition under its auspices. The Organising Committee shall be responsible for the collection and confirmation that all participants have completed the agreement.

11.4 Non - Compliance. Any competitor who refuses to sign the Arbitration Agreement will not be permitted to compete in the Championship.

### 11.5 ISSF Eligibility Rules.

#### ISSF Eligibility and Sponsorship Rules

(These rules are a direct quotation from the Eligibility Rules issued by the ISSF 2005/3rd Printing)

#### Section 4 - ISSF Eligibility and Sponsorship Rules

##### 4.1.0 Eligibility of Shooters

4.1.1 The ISSF Eligibility Rules specify the conditions under which shooters are eligible to participate in ISSF Championships (see ISSF General Regulations). These Eligibility Rules must be applied strictly in all ISSF Championships.

4.1.2 The ISSF recognizes Rule 41, Rule 42 and Rule 53 of the Olympic Charter and the Bye-Laws to these Rules as basic documents for the ISSF Eligibility Rules.

4.1.3 To be eligible to participate in ISSF supervised Championships, a shooter must be entered in the Championship in accordance with Article 3.6 of the ISSF General Regulations by his/her National Federation. Shooters entered by a National Federation must:

4.1.3.1 be selected to participate in accordance with procedures established by the shooter's National Federation, except that shooters entered in the Olympic Games also must comply with the "Special Regulations for the Participation in the Shooting Sport Events of the Olympic Games" (Article 3.12.3.1, Annex "Q", ISSF General Regulations);

4.1.3.2 be national of the country they represent in accordance with Rule 42 of the Olympic Charter, the Bye-Law to this Rule, and the ISSF General Regulations;

4.1.3.3 not have been guilty of improper or unsportsmanlike conduct, particularly through the use of doping or violence;

4.1.3.4 not have violated ISSF rules for sponsorship or advertising as specified in Article 4.2 of these Rules.

4.1.4 Shooters who compete in ISSF Championships may accept, directly or indirectly, money payments or other prizes as awards or as an inducement to take part in a competition, except that no shooter's participation in the Olympic Games may be conditional on any financial consideration (Bye-Law to Rule 41 of the Olympic Charter).

4.1.5 A shooter who knowingly takes part in a competition vetoed by the ISSF may be excluded from ISSF Championships for a prescribed period by the Executive Committee.

4.1.6 A National Federation that enters a shooter in an ISSF Championship who is excluded from competition in accordance with ISSF Anti-Doping Regulations or other ISSF Rules shall lose all its privileges except the right to be represented at the next General Assembly.

#### Sponsorships and Advertising

A sponsorship is any contract-based support of a shooter or organization provided to the shooter in the form of money, goods or services.

4.2.2 These rules apply to all official parts of ISSF supervised Championships events (training and competition, opening, closing and award ceremonies).

4.2.3 A National Federation may enter into a contract with a commercial firm or organization for sponsorships, the provision of equipment or advertising.

4.2.4 An individual shooter may enter into a contract for an individual sponsorship with a commercial firm or an organization.

4.2.5 Sponsorship contracts may authorize the pictures, names or athletic performances of shooters to appear in the advertisements of contracting commercial firms.

4.2.6 Payments to individual shooters under such contracts may be made either to the shooter or the National Federation.

4.2.7 Sponsor markings on signs, banners, posters or other material may be displayed on shooter's clothing and equipment on the ranges and on other facilities at ISSF Championships, if such sponsor markings are in accordance with these Regulations.

4.2.7.1 During the Olympic Games, no advertising with signs, banners, posters or other means is permitted unless such advertising is authorized by the IOC Rules, in particular by IOC Charter Rule 61 and its Bye-Laws. For the Olympic Games, sponsor markings are not permitted and shall be removed or covered.

4.2.7.2 Advertising on the ranges may not be placed in the target areas in such a way that it interferes with the sight pictures of the shooters.

#### 4.3.0 Commercial Markings on Shooters' Clothing and Equipment

4.3.1 A trademark is a distinctive name, symbol, motto, or design that legally identifies a company or its products and services, in order to distinguish them from those offered by others.

4.3.2 A commercial marking is any visible occurrence of a trademark or an advertising sign on an item of an equipment or clothing used during the competition. There are two types of commercial marking:

##### 4.3.2.1 Manufacturer Identification

A manufacturer identification is a display of the manufacturer name or of a trademark on a product made by the manufacturer (trademark owner) with the aim to identify the product and/or its origin;

##### 4.3.2.2 Sponsor Marking

A sponsor marking is any advertising sign on a product different from manufacturer identification.

#### 4.3.3 General Rules for Manufacturer Identification

4.3.3.1 At ISSF Championships, any manufacturer identification on all items of shooters' equipment must be the same as those on the same product sold to the public. Trademarks and company names must only be those of the product manufacturer and must only be used once per article. Additional technical specifications about the size, form and place of trademark signs, company names and individual letters on items of shooters' equipment may be decided by the ISSF Executive Committee upon the recommendation of the Eligibility Committee.

4.3.3.2 The manufacturer identification must not appear more than once per item of clothing and equipment. Gun parts are considered to be items of equipment.

#### 4.3.4 General Rules for Sponsor Markings

4.3.4.1 Equipment or goods supplied to a national team must, with reference to manufacturer identification, conform to the specifications in Article 4.3.2 of these Rules.

4.3.4.2 Sponsor markings on bare skin are not allowed.

4.3.5 During training and competition all items which have the sole purpose of displaying a sponsor marking and/or which are not used in connection with the competition are not allowed.

4.3.6 No pictures or portraits of shooters wearing clothing with commercial markings in contravention those specified in these rules may be used in advertising.

#### 4.3.7 Measuring Manufacturer Identification

4.3.7.1 Manufacturer identification may be divided into the following categories:

4.3.7.1.1 the manufacturer name; or

4.3.7.1.2 the manufacturer logo; or

4.3.7.1.3 a combination of the manufacturer name and the manufacturer logo.

4.3.7.2 Manufacturer identification will be measured as follows:

4.3.7.2.1 Regular Shapes. Where the manufacturer identification appears as a rectangle or a square, the mathematical rules used to calculate the surface area of the shape will be applied.

4.3.7.2.2 Irregular Shapes. Where the manufacturer identification is an irregular shape, a rectangle will be traced around the entire area of the identification and the mathematical rules used to calculate the surface area of the rectangle shall be applied.

4.3.7.2.3 Combined Shapes. Where the manufacturer identification combines the manufacturer name with the manufacturer logo, a rectangle will be traced around the entire area of the identification and the mathematical rules used to calculate the surface area of the rectangle shall be applied.

#### 4.4.0 Special Rules for Commercial Markings used on Shooters' Equipment and Clothing

##### 4.4.1 Guns

4.4.1.1 Manufacturer Identification. All guns conforming to the competition rules of the ISSF are permitted. The manufacturer identification must be the same as the identification on commercially available arms and may appear only once per gun part and may not exceed 10% of the surface area. However, there shall be no manufacturer's identification greater than 60cm<sup>2</sup>.

4.4.1.2 Sponsor Markings. Guns may have one commercial sponsor marking. The marking may appear on both sides of the gun.

4.4.2 Gun Cases (Tool cases, shooting bags, suitcases or cloth bags and other items of shooting equipment such as rifle sling, kneeling roll, belt, telescope stands etc. (this includes the organizer's shooting mats)).

4.4.2.1 Manufacturer Identification. The manufacturer identification must be the same as the identification on commercially available items and may appear only once per item and may not exceed 10% of the surface area. However, there shall be no manufacturer's identification greater than 60cm<sup>2</sup>.

4.4.2.2 Sponsor Markings. No restrictions apply.

4.4.3 Shooting Shoes

4.4.3.1 Manufacturer identification. One manufacturer identification per shooting shoe with a maximum of 6 cm<sup>2</sup> is permitted.

4.4.3.2 Sponsor Markings. Shooting shoes may carry one commercial sponsor marking. The marking, which must be identical, may appear on both shooting shoes.

4.4.4 Gloves

4.4.4.1 Manufacturer Identification. One manufacturer identification per glove with a maximum of 6 cm<sup>2</sup> is permitted.

4.4.4.2 Sponsor Markings. There may be one commercial sponsor marking per glove.

4.4.5 Headgear

4.4.5.1 The front and/or back of the headgear may only be used for the national or national federation emblem, the emblem of the ISSF or the emblem of a competition organizer but without a sponsor marking.

4.4.5.2 Manufacturer Identification. Headgear may carry one manufacturer identification with a maximum size of 6 cm<sup>2</sup> but not on the front or the back.

4.4.5.3 Sponsor Markings. There may be one commercial sponsor marking on each side of the headgear but not on the front or the back.

4.4.6 Shooting Glasses or Eyewear and Side Blinders

4.4.6.1 Manufacturer Identification. Glasses and Side Blinders may carry one manufacturer identification with a maximum size of 6 cm<sup>2</sup>.

4.4.6.2 Sponsor Markings. There may be one commercial sponsor marking, but only on both sides of the frames of glasses or both Side Blinders.

4.4.6.3 Front Blinders. No manufacturer identification nor Sponsor Markings are permitted.

4.4.7 Ear Protection

4.4.7.1 Manufacturer Identification. Ear Protection may carry one manufacturer identification with a maximum size of 6 cm<sup>2</sup>.

4.4.7.2 Sponsor Markings. There may be one commercial sponsor marking, but only on each side of the ear protector.

4.4.8 Competition Clothing. Competition clothing includes all clothing worn by the shooter during his/her performance in competition or in training.

4.4.8.1 Manufacturer Identification. Articles of clothing may carry one manufacturer identification per item. The manufacturer identification may not exceed 20cm<sup>2</sup>.

4.4.8.2 Sponsor Markings. The clothing worn by a shooter is divided into areas identified in Table 1. The restrictions given in the Table must be followed. This rule applies to any type of competition clothing.

4.4.8.2.1 Regulations for Sponsor Markings on Competition Clothing: Table 1

4.4.9 Dress Uniform. A dress uniform includes all clothing worn by the shooter and the members of the team during all official parts of the Championships, where protocol requires a display of the emblem, name or abbreviation of the national federation on the clothing.

4.4.9.1 Manufacturer Identification. The manufacturer identification shall not exceed 20cm<sup>2</sup>.

4.4.9.2 Sponsor Markings. Official dress uniforms may not carry any commercial advertising, but they may carry the name or trademark of up to three sponsors of a National Federation.

4.4.10 Casual Clothing includes all clothing worn by the shooter under other circumstances listed in Article 4.4.8 and 4.4.9 in these Rules. No advertising restrictions apply to this kind of clothing.

4.5.0 Sponsor Markings - ISSF and Organizing Committee Sponsors

4.5.1 In accordance with Article 3.12.3.11, Annex "B" of the ISSF General Regulations, the ISSF reserves the right to control sponsor signs at the main entrance of ISSF Championship ranges, official scoreboards, and official score monitors, target frames and Bib (Start) Numbers for sponsors contracted by the ISSF.

4.5.2 Bib (Start) Numbers

Bib (Start) Numbers may include the commercial marking of ISSF Championship sponsors, provided all competitors use numbers marked similarly. Not more than 150cm<sup>2</sup> or a maximum of 25% of the Bib (Start) Numbers area may be dedicated to the general sponsor marking. However, Bib (Start) Numbers must be worn by all shooters, on their backs and above the waist, at all times while participating in all training and competition. If the Bib (Start) Number is not displayed the shooter may not compete/continue. The Bib (Start) Numbers must display the name, initials and the nation of the shooter. The IOC abbreviation of the nation must be used. The minimum height of the letters should be as big as possible but should not be less than 20 mm.

4.5.2.1 For Shotgun the IOC abbreviation of the nation of the shooter and his name and first initial in Latin letters must be displayed (IOC abbreviation at the top) at the back of the shoulder area of his outer shooter garment.

4.5.3 Signs and Banners

ISSF Championship organizing committees may recognize general and other sponsors with appropriate signs and banners displayed at the range and other areas controlled by the organizing

committee during an ISSF Championship or with advertising in the official program and other publications associated with the ISSF Championship.

#### 4.6.0 Controls and Sanctions

4.6.1 The National Federations, together with the ISSF, are responsible for enforcing the ISSF Eligibility and Sponsorship Rules.

4.6.2 The Competition Juries are responsible for enforcing, within the competition areas, ISSF rules concerning advertising on equipment and clothing.

4.6.3 In case of violation, the Jury must issue an oral warning or a written warning. A shooter not complying with the rules must not be permitted to start or to continue in the competition.

4.6.4 Decisions by the Competition Juries concerning infringement of these rules may be appealed to the Jury of Appeal whose decision is final.

4.6.5 If an advertiser exploits the use of the name, title, or individual picture of a shooter in connection with any advertisement, endorsement or sale of goods without the approval or the knowledge of the shooter, the shooter may give "power of attorney" to his/her National Federation or to the ISSF to enable them, if necessary, to take legal action against the advertiser in question. If the shooter concerned fails to do so, the ISSF shall judge the situation as if the shooter had given full permission to the advertiser.

#### 4.7.0 Approval

These Eligibility Rules were amended and approved by the Executive Committee of the ISSF on 22nd October 1999 and amended on 8th September 2003. They replace previous editions of the "ISSF Eligibility Rules" and become effective immediately.

## **APPENDIX G – GUIDELINES FOR THE TECHNICAL COMMITTEE**

The Chairman of the committee will be elected by the General Assembly according to Art. 6.4.4.

The Presidium elects the members of the committee for a four-year term of office according to Art. 7.2.4.

(In 2007 for a two-year term.)

One position in each Discipline Group shall be reserved for a woman or a man. If no woman or man has been

nominated, or if nominated receives no votes, that position shall remain open.

The Chairman may be invited to take part in Presidium meetings with voice, but without vote. Art. 8.5.

General duties for the committee are:

Work as a reference groups for the ESC Presidium. Answering questions and run tests upon request.

Establish services for the organising of championships.

Create guidelines for implementing rules and regulations of the ISSF and ESC.

Nominate juries for European Championships and European Cup finals. (Range juries and Classification juries.)

The Discipline Groups of the Technical Committee must for each Rifle, Pistol and Running Target Jury nominate at least one (1) member of the Jury from non-committee members and at least two (2)

members of the Shotgun Jury from non-committee members.

One of the three members of the Discipline Groups of the Technical Committee, representing the discipline of the Jury in question, must be appointed Chairman or member of the Jury.

Develop new ideas to promote the European shooting sport and, after analyses and tests bring the completed proposals to the Presidium.

Discuss problems and advise organisers and shooters. Report findings to the ESC Presidium.

Formulate ways of increasing interest in the shooting sport amongst juniors.

The Technical Committee shall meet at least once a year after notification by the President. The Discipline Groups have separate meetings before the Discipline Reference Group convenes the following day to summarise the work of the Discipline Groups and prepare the necessary documents

for the Presidium.

If possible meetings shall be scheduled in conjunction with European Championships or other important shooting sport events.

The minutes must be submitted to the President within four (4) weeks, and proposals, drafts, test results and notifications at least six (6) weeks before the next meeting of the Presidium, according to

Art. 8.2.1.
